

Debbie Singer's first job out of college was with Whirlpool.

"I traveled around showing people how to use microwaves," Debbie said.

It was 1977, and the microwave was brand new. In an effort to boost sales, Whirlpool hired home economists to educate people on what can be done with a microwave. One of the demonstrations Debbie performed was making microwave peanut brittle.

Debbie still frequently makes her peanut brittle.

"It has a really good flavor, and it doesn't stick to your teeth," Debbie said.

Debbie Singer's Microwave Peanut Brittle

INGREDIENTS:

Cooking spray

1 cup sugar

- 1/2 cup white corn syrup
- 1 cup roasted, salted peanuts

1 tablespoon butter or margarine

- 1 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

DIRECTIONS:

1 Microwave cooking times may vary depending on wattage of microwave, and some higher wattage microwaves may require cutting 30 seconds from each cook time segment.

 $2 \mbox{Lightly spray}$ a cookie sheet with cooking spray (or grease with butter). Spray wooden spoon with cooking spray for spreading brittle later.

 $\begin{array}{l} 3 \text{ In a microwave safe 1 } \ensuremath{\frac{1}{2}}\xspace - 4 \text{ minutes.} \end{array}$

 $5^{\rm Stir}$ in peanuts. Microwave on high an additional 2½ to 4 $5^{\rm Stir}$ in util a nice golden brown.

6Add butter or margarine and vanilla to hot syrup/peanut mixture. Microwave on high 30 seconds to 2 minutes more. Be careful not to over brown.

 $7 \rm Add$ baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Quickly spread mixture onto the greased cookie sheet with wooden spoon, as candy hardens fast. Let stand until cool. Break into small pieces.

Yields: 1 pound of brittle



Top 10 Energy Efficiency Tips

Want to save energy and money at home? Check out our top 10 low-cost or no-cost energy efficiency tips to help you save.

- 1. Know what impacts your energy use. Start by comparing your energy usage from month to month, or year to year, on your billing statement.
- 2. Evaluate your insulation levels. Adding insulation will help keep your home warm in the winter and cool in the summer. Note: In the winter, cold floors and walls are signs of a poorly insulated home.
- **3.** Check your heating equipment. Make sure your furnace or other heating equipment is working properly by having it regularly checked and serviced. And change your furnace filter often!
- 4. Wrap your hot water tank and install pipe insulation. Hot water tank wraps and pipe insulation can be purchased at most hardware stores. Wrap the tank and install pipe insulation on the first 10 feet of the hot water pipe coming off the tank.
- 5. Check your hot water heater's temperature. Set your water heater to 120 degrees F.
- 6. Check your refrigerator and freezer temperatures. Your fridge should be set between 37 and 40 degrees F and your freezer between 0 and 5 degrees F.
- 7. Inspect your windows and doors for air leaks. You have air leaks if you can see daylight peeking through your door or window frame. Seal up the leaks by caulking, adding weather stripping or installing a door sweep.
- 8. Install low-flow faucet aerators and showerheads. These can be purchased at most hardware stores.
- **9. Change out your lightbulbs.** Replace incandescent lightbulbs with energy-efficient LEDs.
- **10. Look for tax credits.** See if your energy efficiency projects and measures qualify for tax credits.

- These federal funds are available to those who may not otherwise be able to afford to heat their homes or apartments during the winter. - The Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP) A household that has not received LIEAP assistance during the heating season may qualify for ECIP assistance during a crisis, such as having a shutoff or disconnection notice, or having an eviction notice for nonpayment if heat is included in the rent.
