What's new on your bill Jan. 1

Your electric and natural gas rates are changing on Jan. 1.

Electric rates will include the quarterly **Supply Rate** adjustment, a **\$4.06** monthly bill increase for a typical residential electric customer using 750 kilowatts.

On Nov. 19, the Montana Public Service Commission (PSC) voted on our July 2024 request to update **our electric and natural gas rates.** A public hearing on that request was held in June. The final order to implement the Montana PSC action is expected to be issued by the PSC by Dec. 24. Bill impacts for natural gas and electric customers will be calculated as ordered by the PSC.

Both electric and natural gas rates will include the annual **State and Local Tax adjustment**. This adjustment will also be calculated after the PSC's final order to update **our electric and natural gas rates** is issued. This adjustment will also be in rates on Jan. 1.

Understanding Your Bill

Your electric and natural gas bill includes several rate components:



Supply Rate: The cost of electricity and natural gas you use. The Electric Supply Rate adjusts quarterly. The Natural Gas Supply Rate generally adjusts monthly.



Delivery Rate: The cost of delivering energy to your home or business.



State and Local Tax: The cost of property taxes on the powerlines, pipelines, generation facilities and other energy infrastructure that provide energy service to our customers in Montana. Up to 14% of NorthWestern Energy's residential electric customers' monthly bills in 2025 were due to State and Local Tax costs, that are implemented by the State of Montana and flow

Ways to Save

- Make sure your refrigerator is set between 37 and 40 degrees F and the freezer is between 0 and 5 degrees F.
